Adjusted Population Estimates

Population Estimates Now Based on the 2006 Census

- On September 29, 2008, Statistics Canada released the first population estimates based on the 2006 Census adjusted for net undercoverage.
- These population estimates incorporate upward adjustments to the 2006 Census counts to take into account the number of people missed or doublecounted by the Census (net undercoverage).
- The same Statistics Canada population release includes additional revisions to previously released population estimates as far back as 1971.

Estimates for Latest Years Revised Downwards

- Estimated population growth over the 2001-2006 period was revised downward by an average of 7,800 annually, resulting in lower total population estimates throughout the period.
- The 2006 Census-based population estimate for Ontario on July 2006 is 40,000 lower than previously estimated (2001 Census-based).
- However, since estimated population growth during year 2006-07 was revised upward by almost 30,000, the revised total population estimate for July 2007 is only 10,000 lower.
- The preliminary Ontario population estimate for 2008 is 12,928,996.

B.C. & Alberta See Largest Revisions

- Quebec, Alberta and British Columbia saw larger revisions in population estimates for July 2007 compared to Ontario. Population was revised down almost 15,000 in Quebec, up almost 37,000 in Alberta, and down 70,000 in British Columbia.
- Ontario's share of Canada in 2007 remained virtually unchanged (revised from 38.83% to 38.85%).
- The revisions did not change Ontario's average growth rate between 2001 and 2007 of 1.2 per cent, the second highest among the provinces (Alberta was 2.3%).
- For 2007-08, growth of 1.1 per cent estimated for Ontario was slower than all four western provinces and P.E.I. The 2007-08 population growth rate for Canada was 1.2 per cent.

Components of Population Growth

Issued: September 29, 2008

Natural Increase

- Close to one-third of net population growth in Ontario came from natural increase (birth minus deaths) between 2001 and 2006.
- There were 658,000 births and 418,000 deaths over the five-year period, for a total natural increase of 240,000 people. Both the number of births and deaths are increasing, while natural increase remains roughly stable just below 50,000 annually.
- Births are rising due to a slight increase in the Total Fertility Rate observed since the historical low of 2002. Similarly, population aging means a greater number of seniors and therefore an increasing number of deaths (even as life expectancy rises).


International Migration

- International migration is by far the largest contributor to population growth in Ontario. Over the 2001-06 period, 653,000 immigrants settled in the province, 90,000 people emigrated, and the number of nonpermanent residents increased by 43,000, for a total net international migration gain of 607,000.
- While annual emigration levels have been roughly stable since 2001, annual immigration ranged from 153,000 in 2001-02 (a record setting year) to 110,000 in 2002-03. About 115,000 immigrants settled in Ontario during each of the two most recent years.
- The share of Canada's immigrants settling in Ontario has fallen from 59.6 per cent in 2001-02 to 46.1 per cent in 2007-08.
- The annual change in the number of non-permanent residents (NPRs) in Ontario is volatile and subject to frequent revisions. Over the long-term, the number of NPRs in Ontario has been increasing.

Interprovincial Migration

- Interprovincial migration is a cyclical component of population growth. Over the 2001-06 period, Ontario saw a net interprovincial migration loss of close to 30,000. Net losses were also observed in 2006-07 (-20,000) and 2007-08 (-16,500). Most of the net losses in recent years were with Alberta.
- Recent net losses were mostly the result of rapidly increasing interprovincial out-flows, while in-flows increased as well, but to a lesser extent.
